CITY OF MEMPHIS NAMES STREET AFTER RP1 MEMBER

JUDGE BERNICE Bouie Donald

[MEMPHIS, TN] Lawyers, former law clerks, friends, and family all came together Saturday, Oct. 19, 2024 from around the country to honor Judge Bernice Bouie Donald, the first African-American female judge in Tennessee and a trail blazer for several decades on the federal judiciary.

Judge Donald was honored with a street-naming ceremony, where several lawyers, colleagues, and members of the Memphis community recognized her myriad achievements and contributions to the careers and lives of so many.

Judge Donald's speech noted how the part of Front Street named after her - the portion of the street between Poplar and Beale - represents "the soul and spine of the city" as two of the first and most historic streets in Memphis history.

Judge Donald spoke to the responsibility of building community, always with an eye towards the future." My life's work has been and will continue to be the work of equity, opportunity, inclusion, and justice," Judge Donald proclaimed. "Each of us must be committed to the goal of justice... The blanket of justice has not always covered everyone equally, but the goal of us in here must be to make sure that everyone is covered by that blanket of justice. You see, the law has no hands, no eyes, no ears, no heart. I only becomes a reality when we, people of courage, people of commitment, people of vision, make certain that the law becomes reality. Without us, they are just words."

Judge Donald became the first African-American female judge in Tennessee in 1982 after she was elected to the General Sessions Court: Judge Donald later served nearly 35 years in the federal courts: first, as a bankruptcy judge, then as a District Judge for the Western District of Tennessee, and, finally, as an appellate judge on the United States Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit.

Judge Andre Mathis, who was confirmed to Judge Donald's seat following her retirement in 2023, spoke about how Judge Donald broke glass ceilings "with the grace, dignity and integrity that every judge should strive for."

Other speakers included Mayor Paul A. Young, Congressman Steve Cohen, and Professor Daniel Kiel at the University of Memphis School of Law.

The Street Naming Resolution was proposed by Councilwoman Jana Swearengen-Wasington and passed on July 9, 2024, after a unanimous vote by the Memphis City Council. Councilwoman Janika White, Esq., served as the Event Chair for the official ceremony.

The stretch of roads dedicated at Saturday's ceremony between Poplar Avenue and Beale Street, now Judge Bernice Bouie Donald Street, tells the story of people who surpassed enslavement and segregation and built up a community of economic independence and the civil rights leadership. These streets chronicle a past overcome and the future made possible because of a woman who fought her entire life for change.
